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## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This Digest is produced annually by the Missouri State Highway Patrol (MSHP), Statistical Analysis Center (SAC). In the past, the primary source of data was law enforcement agencies who voluntarily submitted crime statistics to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR). Since only a small percentage of agencies submitted data directly to the FBI's UCR Program, the SAC relied on statistical estimates to measure the extent of crime in Missouri. Beginning in 2001, Missouri's Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR) began operation. Statutorily, Missouri law enforcement agencies are required to submit their crime statistics to Missouri's UCR Program. Using these data, the SAC no longer has to rely on statistical estimates. When comparing 2001 and later years' crime statistics to 2000 and prior years, users need to keep in mind two different statistical methods were employed to derive Missouri's crime totals.

The Crime Index is the sum of eight major offenses and is used to measure the magnitude of crime in the United States. Only eight major offenses are included in the Index because of their frequency of occurrence and the fact they are most likely to be reported to law enforcement agencies. These Index offenses are: murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The first four make up the Violent Crime Index and the last four make up the Property Crime Index.

In 2009, 233,467 Crime Index offenses were reported in the State of Missouri. In 2009, one Index Crime was committed every 2.3 minutes. In 24.2 of every 100 Crime Index offenses, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.

### **Violent Crime Index**

Violent offenses made up 12.6 percent of the total 2009 Missouri Crime Index. There were 29,456 Violent Index offenses reported in 2009. A violent offense was committed in Missouri every 17.8 minutes. In 46.5 of every 100 Violent Index offenses, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means. A brief analysis of each type of Violent Index offense is given below.

- ◆ 402 murders reported in 2009. While murder is the most serious Index offense, it made up only 0.2 percent of the total 2009 Missouri Crime Index. One murder was committed every 21.8 hours. In 65.4 percent of every 100 murders, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.

***Of the index offenses reported in 2009:***

***12.6% were violent offenses***

***One violent crime was committed every 17.8 minutes***

**Between 2008 and 2009:**

*Violent Crime decreased 0.8%*

→ *Murder decreased 15.2%*

→ *Rape decreased 0.7%*

→ *Robbery increased 0.5%*

→ *Aggravated Assault decreased 1.0%*

- ◆ 1,615 forcible rapes reported in 2009. Forceable rape accounted for 0.7 percent of the total 2009 Missouri Crime Index. One forcible rape was committed every 5.4 hours. In 42.2 percent of every 100 forcible rapes, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- ◆ 7,422 robberies reported in 2009. Robbery accounted for 3.2 percent of the total 2009 Missouri Crime Index. One robbery occurred every 1.2 hours. In 27.1 percent of every 100 robberies, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- ◆ There were 20,017 aggravated assaults reported in 2009. Aggravated assault accounted for 8.6 percent of the total 2009 Missouri Crime Index. One aggravated assault occurred every 26.3 minutes. In 53.6 percent of every 100 aggravated assaults, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.

## Property Crime Index

**Of the index offenses reported in 2009:**

*87.4% were property offenses*

*One property crime was committed every 2.6 minutes*

Property offenses made up 87.4 percent of the total 2009 Missouri Crime Index. There were 204,011 Property Index offenses reported in 2009. Property offenses accounted for \$301,963,945 in property stolen or destroyed. One such offense occurred every 2.6 minutes in the State. In 21.0 percent of every 100 Property Index offenses, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means. A brief analysis of each type of Property Index offense is given below.

**Between 2008 and 2009:**

*Property Crime decreased 9.5%*

→ *Burglary decreased 4.5%*

→ *Theft decreased 6.1%*

→ *Motor Vehicle Theft decreased 16.2%*

→ *Arson increased 32.3%*

- ◆ 43,586 burglaries reported in 2009. Burglary accounted for 18.7 percent of the total 2009 Missouri Crime Index. One burglary occurred every 12.1 minutes and \$66,582,606 in property / cash was stolen in 2009 due to this offense. In 14.3 percent of every 100 burglaries, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- ◆ 140,615 thefts reported in 2009. Theft accounted for 60.2 percent of the total 2009 Missouri Crime Index. One theft occurred every 3.7 minutes and \$96,938,077 in property / cash was stolen in 2009 due to this offense. In 24.0 percent of every 100 thefts, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.

- ◆ 17,396 motor vehicle thefts reported in 2009. Motor vehicle theft accounted for 7.5 percent of the total 2009 Missouri Crime Index. One motor vehicle theft occurred every 30.2 minutes and \$102,753,581 in property was stolen in 2009 due to this offense. In 14.8 percent of every 100 motor vehicle thefts, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.
- ◆ 2,414 arsons reported in 2009. Arson accounted for 1.0 percent of the total 2009 Missouri Crime Index. One arson occurred every 3.6 hours and \$35,513,928 in property was destroyed due to arson in 2009. In 12.0 percent of every 100 arsons, the cases were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.

In addition to crime index offense and arrest data, this publication contains data on domestic violence incidents, officers killed or assaulted in the line of duty, and law enforcement employment levels in the State of Missouri.

### **Domestic Violence**

In 2009, law enforcement agencies in Missouri reported 36,943 incidents of domestic violence. In these incidents, 45 were homicides.

*45 homicides in 2009 were domestic violence related.*

These included:

- ◆ 8,886 incidents of spousal abuse (includes former spouses).
- ◆ 12,417 incidents between individuals living together or individuals who have lived together in the past.
- ◆ 5,993 incidents between blood relatives.
- ◆ 4,361 incidents between couples with child(ren) in common.

*24.1% of all domestic violence incidents reported in 2009 involved spouses (includes former spouses).*

### **Law Enforcement Officers Killed**

In 2009, five officers were killed feloniously in the line of duty in the State of Missouri.

*In 2009, eight officers died in the line of duty*

## INTRODUCTION

This publication is one in a series prepared by the Missouri State Highway Patrol, Statistical Analysis Center (SAC). It is designed to present data on crime and arrest activity in Missouri from 2000 through 2009 with special emphasis on the most recent year's crime and arrest activity (2009).

The crime and arrest data in this publication are segmented into ten parts. The first section displays the Missouri Crime Clock. This clock offers an overview of the frequency of occurrence of Crime Index offenses committed in the State in relation to time. The Crime Index is the sum of the eight major offenses used to indicate the occurrence of crime in the United States. The eight offenses making up the total Crime Index are: murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The second section provides data related to Crime Index offenses committed in the State of Missouri. Its purpose is to provide a comparison of the various types of Crime Index offenses so their relative importance can be assessed. In addition, Crime Index activity is displayed by geographical regions of the State and also over time to observe trends. The third section presents data on arrest activity and clearance rates associated with Crime Index offenses as well as arrest activity associated with other classes of criminal offenses. These data provide an appreciation of criminal enforcement activity being performed in the State by class of crime. The fourth section provides a series of data and analysis related to each of the eight types of Crime Index offenses. Data are provided on crime activity, clearance rates, crime patterns, and arrest activity associated with each of these offenses. Section five provides summary data on domestic violence incidents committed in Missouri and identifies relationships between domestic violence victims and offenders. The sixth section provides summary data on Crime Index offenses and arrest activity for specific political subdivisions in the State. Sections seven and eight provide summary data on law enforcement officers killed and assaulted while on duty. Section nine provides uniform and civilian employment information for Missouri law enforcement agencies. Section ten provides data on law enforcement employees as well as the number of assaults on sworn personnel for specific political subdivisions in the State.

Prior to 2001, data in this Digest were provided on a voluntary basis by Missouri law enforcement agencies to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI), Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program. In 2001, state statute RSMo 43.505 was enacted requiring Missouri law enforcement agencies to report their UCR crime statistics to the Missouri UCR Program administered by the Missouri State Highway Patrol.

***Eight offenses make up the Crime Index. They are:***

- *Murder*
- *Rape*
- *Robbery*
- *Aggravated Assault*
- *Burglary*
- *Theft*
- *Motor Vehicle Theft*
- *Arson*

**Increases in crime activity may reflect the transition from a voluntary to mandatory UCR Program. Care is warranted when directly comparing crime statistics since 2001 to previous years for this reason.**

The national UCR Program was initiated in 1930 by the Committee on Uniform Crime Reports of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP). This committee developed uniform offense and arrest classifications as well as reporting procedures which could be used by law enforcement agencies throughout the nation. The FBI was designated to administer the Program and became the national clearinghouse for UCR data. The Committee on Uniform Crime Reports of the IACP continues to serve the national Program in an advisory capacity. In 1966, the National Sheriff's Association also established a Committee on Uniform Crime Reports to act as an advisory body for this program and to promote reporting to the UCR Program.

Crime and arrest data are, for the most part, collected on a monthly basis by several methods in Missouri. The Missouri UCR Program provides report forms, tally sheets, and self-addressed envelopes to Missouri law enforcement agencies who complete and return them to the Program. Missouri law enforcement agencies also have the option of reporting their crime activity on a Web-based UCR reporting application. Data from all Missouri law enforcement agencies are moved to a central data repository maintained by the MSHP.

Data displays identifying specific political subdivision crime and arrest activity contain only activity reported to the UCR Program. It is important to note that statistics for a political subdivision include not only crime and arrest activity reported by a local law enforcement agency, but also crime and arrest activity reported by state agencies (e.g., MSHP, Department of Conservation, Water Patrol). No effort has been made to estimate individual law enforcement agency's crime and arrest activity.

Slight discrepancies may be found if comparisons are made with FBI UCR publications and this Digest covering the same subject matter for the State of Missouri. Although similar, estimation routines and rates per 100,000 population calculations for pre-2001 data used by the FBI are not the same as those in this Digest. Discrepancies also may be noted when examining actual reported figures. This is a result of updates having been made to UCR files between the time the FBI data were processed and the time the SAC analysis was performed. This report is merely a snap shot of crime summary data reported to


the Missouri UCR Program. Law enforcement agencies continually update their UCR data for a variety of reasons. For this reason, statistics in this report may be different than statistics obtained from other sources or reports.

## **1.0 MISSOURI CRIME CLOCK**

The Missouri crime clocks summarize criminal activity in the State during 2009 in relation to time. From this perspective, an appreciation of the relative frequency of various criminal offenses can be obtained. The clocks should be viewed with care. They are designed to convey annual crime experience by showing the relative frequency of occurrence of the index offenses. This mode of display should not be taken to imply a regularity in the commission of crime. Rather they represent the annual ratio of crime to fixed time intervals.

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## **2.0 MISSOURI CRIME INDEX COMPARISON ANALYSIS**

A series of tables and figures summarizes crime index offenses committed in the State of Missouri. The purpose of these displays is to compare the various types of crime index offenses being committed according to their relative contribution to the crime index. In addition, crime index offense rates are displayed by geographic regions of the State, and over time, in order to identify trends.

Prior to 2001, Missouri law enforcement agencies voluntarily reported crime index offense data. To account for non-reporting agencies, Crime Index Offense Rates for these years were based on mathematical estimates. In 2001, RSMo 43.505 mandated all Missouri law enforcement agencies to report crime index offense data to the Missouri Uniform Crime Reporting Program managed by the Missouri State Highway Patrol. For this reason, Crime Index Offense Rates for 2001 and later years are based on data reported by nearly 100% of Missouri law enforcement agencies. Users should keep in mind that transition from a voluntary to a mandatory crime reporting system may affect comparisons of 2001 and later year Crime Index Offense rates to prior years.

Crime Index Offense Rates are computed on a per 100,000 population basis. See Glossary for explanation of computations used to obtain these rates.





**TIME SERIES**




**FIGURE 2.0.2**

**BY COUNTY / 2009**





**TIME SERIES**




**FIGURE 2.0.4**

**BY COUNTY / 2009**









**TIME SERIES**





**TIME SERIES**



## **4.0 MISSOURI DETAIL CRIME INDEX ANALYSIS**

A series of tables and figures summarizes crime activity, clearance rates, crime patterns, and arrest activity associated with specific types of crime index offenses committed in Missouri.

Detail analysis is provided for violent and property crimes reported in 2009.



## 4.1 MURDER

### DEFINITION

Murder and non-negligent manslaughter are the willful killing of one human being by another. Not included in this offense classification are deaths caused by negligence, suicide, accident, justifiable homicide (the killing of a felon by a peace officer in the line of duty or a private citizen during the commission of a felony), and attempts to murder (these are classified as aggravated assaults). Murder offenses are reported on a per victim basis.

### 2009 Summary

- ◆ *402 murders were reported in 2009.*
- ◆ *One murder occurred every 21.8 hours.*
- ◆ *Murder accounted for 0.2 percent of the Total Crime Index and 1.4 percent of all Violent Index offenses.*
- ◆ *The murder rate per 100,000 population was 7.1.*
- ◆ *65.4 percent of every 100 murders were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.*
- ◆ *440 persons were reported arrested for murder in 2009. Of these, 87.0 percent were adults and 13.0 percent were juveniles. Of those arrested, 87.7 percent were male and 12.3 percent were female.*
- ◆ *Of murder victims reported in 2009, 76.9 percent were male and 23.1 percent were female. Of the victims, 82.2 percent were adults and 12.9 percent were juveniles.*
- ◆ *Of all weapons used in 2009 murders, 69.0 percent were firearms and 8.9 percent were knives.*

### MURDER SUMMARY: 2008 and 2009

- ◆ *The murder offense rate decreased 16.5% between 2008 and 2009.*



## 4.2 FORCIBLE RAPE

### DEFINITION

Forcible rape is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults or attempts to commit rape by force or threat of force also are included. However, statutory rape (without force), sex attacks on males, and other types of sex offenses are not included in this category. Forcible rape offenses are reported on a per victim basis.

### 2009 Summary

- ◆ *1,615 rapes were reported in 2009.*
- ◆ *One rape occurred every 5.4 hours.*
- ◆ *Rape accounted for 0.7 percent of the Total Crime Index and 5.5 percent of all Violent Index offenses.*
- ◆ *The rape rate per 100,000 population was 28.6.*
- ◆ *Rape by force constituted 93.3 percent of all rapes while attempted rape accounted for 6.7 percent.*
- ◆ *In 2009, 42.2 percent of every 100 rapes were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.*
- ◆ *549 persons were reported arrested for rape. Of those, 88.9 percent were adults and 11.1 percent were juveniles.*



## 4.3 ROBBERY

### DEFINITION

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear. Robbery involves a theft or larceny but is aggravated by the element of force or threat of force. Robbery offenses are reported on an incident-by-incident basis.

#### **2009 Summary**

- ◆ *7,422 robberies were reported in 2009.*
- ◆ *One robbery occurred every 1.2 hours.*
- ◆ *Robbery accounted for 3.2 percent of the Total Crime Index and 25.2 percent of all Violent Index offenses.*
- ◆ *The robbery rate per 100,000 population was 131.3.*
- ◆ *A firearm was used in 52.5 percent of all robberies.*
- ◆ *Street / Highway robbery was the most prevalent class of robbery accounting for 55.0 percent of all such offenses.*
- ◆ *\$8,670,292 in property / cash was stolen in robberies.*
- ◆ *27.1 percent of every 100 robberies were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.*
- ◆ *2,426 persons were reported arrested for robbery in 2009. Of these, 79.0 percent were adults and 20.9 percent were juveniles.*



## **4.4 AGGRAVATED ASSAULT**

### **DEFINITION**

Aggravated assault is an unlawful attack or attempted attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. All assaults or attempted assaults by one person upon another with the intent to kill, maim, or inflict severe bodily injury with the use of any dangerous weapon are classified under this category of offense. Aggravated assault offenses are reported on a per victim basis.

#### **2009 Summary**

- ◆ *20,017 aggravated assaults were reported in 2009.*
- ◆ *One aggravated assault occurred every 26.3 minutes.*
- ◆ *Aggravated assault accounted for 8.6 percent of the Total Crime Index and 68.0 percent of all Violent Index offenses.*
- ◆ *The aggravated assault rate per 100,000 population was 354.0.*
- ◆ *A firearm was used in 29.2 percent of the cases.*
- ◆ *53.6 percent of every 100 aggravated assaults were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.*



## 4.5 BURGLARY

### DEFINITION

Burglary is the unlawful entry or attempted unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Burglary offenses are reported on an incident-by-incident basis.

#### 2009 Summary

- ◆ *43,586 burglaries were reported during 2009.*
- ◆ *One burglary occurred every 12.1 minutes.*
- ◆ *Burglary accounted for 18.7 percent of the Total Crime Index and 21.4 percent of all Property Index offenses.*
- ◆ *The burglary rate per 100,000 population was 770.4.*
- ◆ *Residential dwellings were involved in 77.0 percent of all burglaries and forcible entry was involved in 60.4 percent.*
- ◆ *\$66,582,606 in property / cash was stolen during burglaries.*
- ◆ *14.3 percent of every 100 burglaries were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.*
- ◆ *6,953 persons were reported arrested for burglary in 2009. Of these, 72.8 percent were adults and 27.3 percent were juveniles.*



## 4.6 THEFT

### DEFINITION

Theft is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Attempted thefts also are included. This category includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts or accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., in which no use of force, violence, or fraud occurs. It does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, or worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft also is excluded inasmuch as it is a separate crime index offense. Theft offenses are reported on an incident-by-incident basis.

### 2009 Summary

- ◆ *There were 140,615 thefts reported during 2009.*
- ◆ *In 2009, one theft occurred every 3.7 minutes.*
- ◆ *Theft accounted for 60.2 percent of the Total Crime Index and 68.9 percent of all Property Index offenses.*
- ◆ *The theft rate per 100,000 population in 2009 was 2,485.0.*
- ◆ *In 2009, 24.7 percent of all thefts involved the taking of vehicle parts / accessories or other types of property from a vehicle.*
- ◆ *Due to this offense, \$96,938,077 in property / cash was stolen in 2009.*
- ◆ *In 2009, 24.0 percent of every 100 thefts were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.*



## 4.7 MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

### DEFINITION

Motor vehicle theft is the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. By definition, a motor vehicle is a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. Motor vehicles include automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, motor scooters, snowmobiles, etc. Motor vehicle theft offenses are reported on a per vehicle basis.

#### 2009 Summary

- ◆ *There were 17,396 motor vehicle thefts reported during 2009.*
- ◆ *In 2009, one motor vehicle theft occurred every 30.2 minutes.*
- ◆ *Motor vehicle theft accounted for 7.5 percent of the Total Crime Index and 8.5 percent of all Property Index offenses.*
- ◆ *The motor vehicle theft rate per 100,000 population was 307.5 in 2009.*
- ◆ *The cost of vehicles stolen in 2009 was \$102,753,581.*
- ◆ *In 2009, 14.8 percent of every 100 motor vehicle thefts were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.*
- ◆ *2,906 persons were reported arrested for motor vehicle theft in 2009. Of these, 76.6 percent were adults and 23.5 percent were juveniles. Of those arrested, 83.2 percent were male and 16.9 percent were female.*



## **4.8 ARSON**

### **DEFINITION**

Arson is defined as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded. Arson offenses are reported on an incident-by-incident basis.

### **2009 Summary**

- ◆ *There were 2,414 arsons reported during 2009.*
- ◆ *In 2009, one arson occurred every 3.6 hours.*
- ◆ *Arsons accounted for 1.0 percent of the Total Crime Index and 1.2 percent of all Property Index offenses.*
- ◆ *The arson rate per 100,000 population in 2009 was 42.7.*
- ◆ *Residential dwellings accounted for 29.5 percent of all types of property destroyed by arson.*
- ◆ *Motor vehicles accounted for 47.7 percent of all types of property destroyed by arson.*
- ◆ *Arson accounted for \$35,513,928 in property loss in 2009.*
- ◆ *In 2009, 12.0 percent of every 100 arsons were cleared by arrest or exceptional means.*
- ◆ *348 persons were reported arrested for arson in 2009. Of these, 61.0 percent were adults and 39.1 percent were juveniles. Of those arrested, 85.4 percent were male and 14.7 percent were female.*

- ◆ *The arson offense rate increased by 30.7% between 2008 and 2009.*



## **5.0 MISSOURI DOMESTIC VIOLENCE ANALYSIS**

This section presents data on Domestic Violence activity in Missouri. Detail analysis is provided on:

- Domestic Violence Incidents
- Domestic Violence Related Homicides

## 5.1 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE RELATED INCIDENTS

### DEFINITION

Domestic violence incidents are reported whether or not an arrest is made and include any dispute arising between spouses, former spouses, persons with child(ren) in common regardless of whether they reside together, persons related by blood, persons related by marriage, non-married persons currently residing together, and non-married persons who have resided together in the past. Domestic violence incidents are reported when an officer believes a dispute crosses an abuse threshold as indicated by harassment, stalking, coercion, assault, sexual assault, battery, or unlawful imprisonment. Domestic violence incidents are reported by the highest ranked relationship between victim and offender, regardless of the number of persons or potential multiple relationships present during an incident.

#### **2009 Summary**

- ◆ *There were 36,943 domestic violence incidents reported in 2009.*
- ◆ *In 2009, 7,804 domestic violence incidents involving spouses were reported.*
- ◆ *There were 10,123 domestic violence incidents involving persons residing together in 2009.*
- ◆ *In 2009, 5,993 domestic violence incidents involving blood relatives were reported.*

## 5.2 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE RELATED HOMICIDES

### DEFINITION

Domestic violence related homicides are the willful killing of one human being by another and the victim and offender are related by blood, related by marriage, reside together, have resided together in the past, or are romantically involved. Suicides following domestic violence homicides are not included. Domestic violence related homicides are reported on a per victim basis.

### 2009 Summary

- ◆ *There were 45 domestic violence related homicides reported during 2009.*
- ◆ *Wives and girlfriends were killed in 48.8% of all domestic violence related homicides.*
- ◆ *Mothers and daughters were killed in 17.8% of all domestic violence related homicides.*

## **6.0 MISSOURI LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY CRIME AND ARREST ANALYSIS**

A series of tables summarizes crime index offenses and arrest activity associated with law enforcement jurisdictions in the State of Missouri. These data displays provide an overview of the extent of the crime problem within Missouri communities.

Population figures in this section are estimates based on the last census taken by the U.S. Census Bureau and represent the population associated with the reporting agency's jurisdiction. For rural counties, the figures represent the jurisdiction normally covered by sheriff's departments and/or county police departments. These population figures are computed by subtracting the population of all incorporated municipalities within a county having their own law enforcement agencies from the total population of the county.

## **6.1 MISSOURI POLITICAL SUBDIVISION INDEX CRIME ANALYSIS**

A series of tables summarizes 2009 crime index offenses and arrests for all political subdivisions in Missouri. These tables display statistics for each index crime and rates per 100,000 population. Index crime totals are also provided for all Missouri counties.

## **7.0 MISSOURI LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED**

A series of tables and figures are presented related to the number of sworn law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty in the State of Missouri. The purpose of these displays is to provide an appreciation of the extent and nature of this serious problem and to increase the awareness of the sacrifice made by the law enforcement community in protecting the lives, rights, and property of Missouri citizens.

## **7.0 MISSOURI LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED**

The information in this section is based on monthly reports submitted by law enforcement agencies to Missouri's Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Additional information on officers killed also was obtained from field investigations conducted by the FBI and reported in the Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted publications.

Officers killed in the line of duty include those officers killed by felonious acts, as well as by accident or negligence. Excluded from this section are fatalities resulting from activities not within the official realm of law enforcement duties or deaths attributed to natural causes. It should be noted that this section contains statistics relative to felonious and accidental, line-of-duty deaths of duly sworn Federal, State, and local law enforcement officers having full arrest powers.


### **2009 Summary**

- ◆ *In 2009, five officers were killed feloniously in the line of duty in the State of Missouri.*
- ◆ *Since 2000, 49 officers have been killed in the line of duty. Of these, 65.3 percent were killed by felonious acts and the other 34.7 percent were killed in accidents or by negligence.*

## **8.0 MISSOURI LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS ASSAULTED**

A series of tables and figures are presented on sworn law enforcement officers assaulted in the line of duty in the State of Missouri. These displays have been included to provide a better perspective of the risks law enforcement officers face in performing their duties and to assist in formulating policies and procedures which may reduce these risks in the future.

## **8.0 MISSOURI LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS ASSAULTED**

Data in this section are based on monthly reports of officer assaults submitted by law enforcement agencies to Missouri's Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Officer assaults are defined as any unlawful attack by a person on a law enforcement officer in the performance of his / her duty. Officer assaults include those assaults which result in serious injury to the officer, all assaults in which the assailant used a weapon which could have caused serious injury or death, and assaults on officers beyond mere verbal abuse or minor resistance to an arrest. Assaults resulting in the death of a law enforcement officer are not included in this section, but can be found in Section 7.0 of this report. Assaults committed on federal law enforcement officers in the State of Missouri are not included in this section.

### **2009 SUMMARY ANALYSIS**

- ◆ *There were 2,197 officer assaults reported during 2009.*
- ◆ *For every 100 officers in the State of Missouri, there were 15.2 percent assaults in 2009.*
- ◆ *Of the 2,197 officer assaults in 2009, 436 or 19.8 percent resulted in injury to an officer.*
- ◆ *One officer was assaulted in the State every 4.0 hours in 2009. In addition, one assault resulting in the injury of an officer occurred every 20.1 hours.*
- ◆ *In 2009, the clearance rate for officer assaults in the State was 83.9 compared to 88.6 in 2008.*
- ◆ *In 2009, 80.5 percent of all assaults on officers involved physical force and 19.5 percent involved a weapon.*
- ◆ *Of all officer assaults in 2009, 54.2 percent occurred from 8:00 p.m. through 3:59 a.m.*
- ◆ *The situation resulting in the greatest number of officer assaults in 2009 was disturbance calls accounting for 30.6 percent of the total.*

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


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**FIGURE 8.0.2**





**2009**




**FIGURE 8.0.4**

## **9.0 MISSOURI LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYMENT**

A series of tables presents data on law enforcement personnel resources in the State of Missouri. The purpose of these displays is to provide an assessment of the amount and general composition of law enforcement resources available in the State.

## **9.0 MISSOURI LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYMENT**

Data in this section are drawn from annual reports on employment submitted by law enforcement agencies to Missouri's UCR Program. Employment figures include full-time sworn officers with full arrest powers, and civilian employees an agency has on its payroll as of October 31 of each year. They do not include part-time or auxiliary officers. This section does not include employment data for federal law enforcement agencies whose jurisdictional responsibilities encompass the State of Missouri.

### **2009 Summary**

- ◆ *Of the 20,368 full-time employees of Missouri law enforcement agencies, 72.0 percent were sworn officers and 28.0 percent were civilians.*
- ◆ *62.8% of the full-time officers work for municipal police departments, 24.8% work for county sheriff departments, 10.9% work for state agencies, and 1.5% work for colleges / universities police departments.*

## **10.0 MISSOURI LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY EMPLOYMENT / ASSAULT ANALYSIS**

A series of tables summarizes the number of law enforcement employees, as well as assaults on sworn personnel associated with law enforcement jurisdictions reporting to Missouri's Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Data displays provide an overview of law enforcement personnel resources and the problem of officer assaults within Missouri communities.

## **10.0 MISSOURI LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY EMPLOYMENT / ASSAULT ANALYSIS**

Officer assaults are defined as the unlawful attack by a person on a law enforcement officer in the performance of his / her duty. Officer assaults include those which result in serious injury to the sworn officer, all assaults in which the assailant used a weapon which could have caused serious injury or death, and assaults on officers beyond mere verbal abuse or minor resistance to an arrest. Assaults resulting in the death of a law enforcement officer are not included, but can be found in Section 7.0 of this report.

Employment information reflects a count of full-time sworn officers with full arrest powers and civilian employees the agency has on its payroll as of October 31 of each reporting year. It does not include part-time employees or auxiliary officers.

Population figures in this section are estimates based on the last census taken by the U.S. Census Bureau and represent the population associated with the reporting agency's jurisdiction. For rural counties, the figures represent the jurisdiction normally covered by sheriff's departments and/or county police departments. These population figures are computed by subtracting the population of all incorporated municipalities within a county having their own law enforcement agencies from the total population of the county.

### **2009 Summary**

- ◆ *Law enforcement agencies reported 20,368 persons employed on a full-time basis in 2009.*
- ◆ *In 2009, there were 14,663 full-time officers in Missouri.*
- ◆ *There were 3.6 sworn officers per 1,000 population in the State in 2009.*

## **GLOSSARY**

## GLOSSARY

**ADULT:** A person 18 years of age or older.

**ARREST:** Taking into physical or other legal custody for committing an offense in the local reporting jurisdiction. Arrests for all criminal offenses are scored. Arrests for ordinance violations are included. Arrests for traffic offenses, with the exception of driving under the influence of intoxicants and arrests in connection with negligent manslaughter in traffic accidents, are not scored. Included are those persons arrested but released without being formally charged.

**ASSAULT:** Officer assaults are defined as any unlawful attack by a person on a law enforcement officer who is in the performance of his / her duty. Officer assaults include those which result in serious injury to the sworn officer, all assaults in which the assailant used a weapon which could have caused serious injury or death, and assaults on officers that were beyond mere verbal abuse or minor resistance to an arrest.

**ASSAULTS PER 100 OFFICERS RATE:** This rate is an indicator of reported officer assault activity standardized by the number of officers employed by the agencies reporting the activity. The officer assault rate formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Officer Assaults} \times 100}{\text{Number of Law Enforcement Officers Employed}}$$

Prior to 2001, assaults per 100 officers were based on estimates from data of agencies reporting a full 12 months of officer assault activity. Since 2001, this rate is based on officer assault activity reported to the Missouri UCR Program.

**ASSIGNMENT:** These categories identify the specific assignment of an officer at the time of the assault. Two-Man Vehicle and One-Man Vehicle pertain to uniformed officers on patrol. Special Assignment pertains to those non-uniformed officers functioning as detectives or on special assignment. Other Assignment pertains to those officers assaulted while functioning in some other capacity, such as foot patrol, off-duty, etc. The term "assisted" refers to law enforcement assistance only.

**CLEARANCE:** The resolution of a criminal offense or an assault on an officer by the arrest, charging, and turning over to the court for prosecution one or more persons alleged to have committed a crime or assault on an officer. An offense also can be cleared by exceptional means when the law enforcement agency has: 1) established the identity of the offender, 2) has enough information to support an arrest, charge, and prosecution in court, 3) the exact location of the offender is known so that he / she could be taken into custody, and 4) there is some reason outside law enforcement control that precludes arresting, charging, and prosecuting the offender, (ex., offender dies).

**CLEARED OFFENSES ONLY JUVENILES:** The number of clearances for an offense in which only juveniles were arrested or were identified as the offender but, for some valid reason, could not be arrested divided by the total number of clearances for that offense expressed as a percentage. The formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Offenses Cleared Involving Only Juveniles}}{\text{Number of Clearances}} \times 100$$

**CLEARANCE RATE (Assault on an Officer):** The number of clearances divided by the total number of assaults, expressed as a percentage. The formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Clearances}}{\text{Number of Assaults}} \times 100$$

**CLEARANCE RATES (Offenses):** The number of clearances divided by the total number of offenses, expressed as a percentage. The formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Clearances}}{\text{Number of Offenses}} \times 100$$

**CRIME INDEX:** The Crime Index is the sum of the eight major offenses used to indicate the occurrence of crime in the United States. They were selected because of their frequency of occurrence and because they are most likely to be reported to a law enforcement agency. The eight offenses are: murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The first four make up the Violent Crime Index and the last four make up the Property Crime Index. Definitions of each of the offenses making up the Crime Index are provided in the section entitled "Missouri Detail Crime Index Analysis". In addition, refer to Crime Index Offense in this section for an explanation of how each type of offense is reported to the UCR Program.

**CRIME INDEX OFFENSE:** In the UCR Program, the offenses of murder, forcible rape, and aggravated assault are crimes against persons. For these crimes, one offense is counted for each victim. Robbery, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson are crimes against property. For these crimes, with the exception of motor vehicle theft, one offense is counted for each distinct operation. In the case of motor vehicle theft, one offense is counted for each stolen vehicle.

**CRIME INDEX OFFENSE ESTIMATES:** Estimation routines were used in the Digest to identify the actual number of index crimes occurring in the State on an annual basis. They are designed to compensate for non-reporting and incomplete reporting of such offenses by Missouri law enforcement agencies. The following procedures and formulas were used to obtain statewide crime index offense estimates:

- Law enforcement agencies in the State of Missouri were categorized into Groups. The following categories were used:

Municipal agency - 250,000 and over  
Municipal agency - population 100,000 - 249,999  
Municipal agency - population 50,000 - 99,999

Municipal agency - population 25,000 - 49,999  
 Municipal agency - population 10,000 - 24,999  
 Municipal agency - population 2,500 - 9,999  
 Municipal agency - population under 2,500  
 Rural Sheriff's Department  
 Suburban Sheriff's Department and County Police

- For those law enforcement agencies within a group reporting six months or more, a yearly estimate of their crime index offenses was obtained using the following formula:

$$\frac{\text{Crime Index Offenses Reported}}{\text{No. of Months Reported}} \times 12 = \text{Yearly Crime Index Offenses}$$

- For each group, the yearly crime index offenses for all law enforcement agencies reporting six months or more and their jurisdiction's population were summed and the following group crime index rate was computed.

$$\frac{\text{Sum of Rpt. Agency's Yearly Crime Index Offenses}}{\text{Sum of Rpt. Agency's Population}} = \frac{\text{Group Crime Index Rate}}{\text{Group Crime Index}}$$

- For those law enforcement agencies reporting less than six months or no activity at all within a group, their yearly crime index offenses were computed using the following formula:

$$\frac{\text{Law Enforcement Agency Population}}{\text{Rate}} \times \frac{\text{Group Crime Index}}{\text{Yearly Crime Index Offenses}} = \frac{\text{Yearly Crime Index Offenses}}{\text{Group Crime Index Rate}}$$

- Yearly crime index offenses computed above for all Missouri law enforcement agencies were then summed in order to obtain a statewide yearly crime index offense estimate for use in this Digest.

No estimation routines were used in data displays identifying specific law enforcement agency's yearly crime activity in the Digest. In these data displays, only crime activity reported to the UCR Program is displayed.

**EMPLOYMENT:** The number of persons, either sworn officers with full arrest powers or civilians, working in a full-time capacity and appearing on the payroll of a Missouri law enforcement agency as of October 31 of a reporting year.

**INDEX CRIMES:** Index Crimes are the eight major offenses used to indicate the occurrence of crime in the United States. They were selected due to their frequency of occurrence and because they are most likely to be reported to a law enforcement agency. The eight offenses are: murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson.

**INDEX CRIMES PER OFFICER RATE:** This rate indicates the number of index crime incidents in a community in relation to the law enforcement agency's sworn officer resource availability. The formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Index Crimes}}{\text{Number of Law Enforcement Officers Employed}}$$

**JUVENILE:** A person under 18 years of age.

**JUVENILE ARREST:** Juvenile arrests do not include law enforcement contacts with juveniles where no offense has been committed. Juveniles taken into custody for their own protection, such as in neglect cases, are not scored since they have not committed any crime.

**OFFICERS PER 1,000 POPULATION RATE:** This rate is an indicator of a law enforcement agency's sworn officer resource availability in relation to the population of the community it serves. The formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Officers Employed} \times 1,000}{\text{Community Population}}$$

**PERCENT CHANGE:** The formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Value in Current Period} - \text{Value in Base Period}}{\text{Value in Base Period}} \times 100$$

**POPULATION:** Total number of persons residing in a jurisdiction based on United States Census data.

**QUARTILE:** The value marking the boundary between two consecutive intervals in a frequency distribution of four intervals with each containing one quarter of the total population.

**RATE PER 100,000 POPULATION:** Rates per 100,000 population are indicators of activity standardized by the population of those law enforcement agencies associated with the activity. Three types of rates are provided: statewide crime index offense rates, reporting agency crime index offense rates, and arrest rates.

The statewide offense rate formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Offenses Reported} \times 100,000}{\text{Population of all Agencies Reporting}}$$

The reporting agency offense rate formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Offenses Reported} \times 100,000}{\text{Population of Reporting Agency(ies)}}$$

The arrest rate formula is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Arrests Reported} \times 100,000}{\text{Population of Reporting Agency(ies)}}$$

**STRONG ARMED ROBBERY:** A robbery wherein no weapons were used but tactics (limited to the use of personal weapons such as hands, arms, feet, fists, teeth, etc.) were employed to deprive the victim of his / her property.

**TIME SERIES:** Time-series analysis was used in the Digest to forecast future crime and arrest activity. With this technique, data for past periods were used as the basis for projecting levels of future activity. Ten years of past data were used to make these projections.

Crime and arrest rates on a per 100,000 population basis were used in making the forecasts. These rates reflect crime and arrest activity in relation to population.

The technique used to project crime and arrest activity was Exponential Smoothing (available through the SAS Econometrics and Time Series software package). Use of this technique took into consideration the limited number of data points in the time series, as well as whether or not the time series was best characterized as constant, linear, or non-linear. In applying the smoothing technique, greater weight was given to the more recent data values than to the earlier data values when projecting future levels of activity.
